
Hats off to another successful year at Abbey Community College!

At the launch event, THRiVE Coordinator, Barnardos' Claire Humphrey, said: "THRiVE is a fantastic example of what's possible when people and organisations collaborate to tackle educational under-achievement."

Abbey Community College student and Deputy Head Girl Courtney Cooper is a key ambassador. The 17-year-old's story was unveiled at the launch attended by boxing champ Carl Frampton. Courtney told how she overcame a troubled childhood to win a place at university with the help from Monkstown Boxing Club.

Courtney said university never crossed her mind until she took part in the programme and now she plans to study Criminology in Cumbria next year.

"It really changed my mind," she added.

far is that 'WE CAN' do better together.
"Look at me, I came from a small estate and
now I'm thriving."




STUDENT EXCHANGE






























Eggstra - Special
