PASTORAL CARE

As an inclusive, caring and child centred school **Abbey Community College** strives to enhance and supports the personal, social and academic development of each individual student in all aspects of College life. All staff play an important role, both within and beyond the classroom, ensuring that all students are given every opportunity to reach their full potential regardless of ability or background.

There is an Induction Programme for Year 8 students in the summer term before they enrol at Abbey Community College. This eases the transition from primary school and helps them to begin making friends. This continues with parental interviews in August, to begin building those important home school relationships, and into September, as students familiarise themselves with facilities on site, meet staff and their peers. Each student will have a Class Tutor who meets them daily and is the first point of contact for parents. The Heads of Year 8 monitor and support all aspects of student progress and development.

Post 16 Mentors attached to each class provide valuable support and guidance for students in the first weeks and months. They meet students regularly and become a friendly face in the corridor, playground, the canteen and on the buses. They help Year 8 students to settle in and answer questions.

Heads of Year and Class Tutors for each year group provide care and support for students of all ages. Individual students meet their Class Tutor daily, developing positive relationships and establishing a direct contact for Parents & Guardians. They have oversight of all aspects of academic, personal and social development and support learners towards success. Valuable partnership with a range of external agencies provide support for our young people when needed.



CHILD PROTECTION AND SAFEGUARDING

All members of Abbey Community College, students, staff and parents have a key role to play in the safeguarding of our young people. A senior member of staff, Mrs C. McNaghten is the Designated Teacher responsible for Child Protection and Safeguarding. She is supported in the role by Deputy Designated Teachers, Mr D. Laney, Mr S Smyth and the Principal, Mrs Quinn.

Student progress and achievement is formally reported to Parents / Guardians through a Parents' Evening for each Year Group and the annual school report. Interim progress reports are also issued throughout the year.

At Key Stage 3 all students have an equal opportunity to follow a challenging and exciting curriculum which meets the requirements of the Northern Ireland Curriculum.

LIBRARY




THE NEXT CHAPTER FOR ABBEY COMMUNITY COLLLEGE

WHAT IS PROPOSED?

- A modern, state of the art, purpose-built education facility, with classrooms to support c.820 students.
- Sports facilities will include 5 tennis / basketball courts, Sports Hall and Fitness Suite

PREFECTS

Senior Prefects and Prefects fulfil a valuable role in school as a link between the students and staff, by modelling expected standards of conduct and in promoting the school to the local community. The roles significantly enhance a student's CV and are particularly valuable when applying to university, higher education and employment.

Students have the opportunity to develop their leadership skills through being a Mentor or involvement with the Student Council. They also help with lunch and break-time supervision, assemblies and other school events.

MENTORING

Sixth Form students have the opportunity to support and mentor Junior School students on a regular basis through a variety of activities.

STUDENT COUNCIL

The Student Council is central to the student voice at Abbey Community College and gives all students the opportunity to be consulted on a variety of issues. Sixth Form members are given the opportunity to lead the Student Council having received training on how to conduct elections and lead meetings. Each Year Group is represented at meetings bringing ideas and suggestions from the respective Year Council.



CAREERS EDUCATION & WORK EXPERIENCE

Careers Education is an integral part of the college curriculum offering experiences for students to explore job opportunities and make informed decisions for the future. A range of events inside and outside the classroom give students insight into a variety of potential jobs and career routes. This is delivered through a taught programme and supplemented by organised events and visits.

In Year 10, students are supported with their Key Stage 4 choices by encouraging them to consider their strengths, skills, and qualities. This is followed up by interviews involving students, parents, and teachers so they can make informed choices.

In Year 11 and 12 students follow a Preparation for Work programme and are supported by an interview with a DfE Careers Advisor. Year 12 also take part in an Interview Skills Day. Both Year 12 and Year 13 students undertake a week's Work Experience which is a valuable opportunity to experience the world of work and is often influential in decision making for the future. Careers Education continues to be increasingly significant for Post 16 students as they explore University and Further Education options alongside those for Apprenticeships and employment. They attend university Open Days and Higher Education Conventions and are given comprehensive guidance with application procedures and support for employment. Post 16 students are also given the opportunity to have an individual careers interview (with the DfE advisor) which helps them make key decisions about the future.

CAREER READY

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For the past three years Abbey Community College has been involved in the UK wide 'Career Ready' programme which has immense potential to support student learning and aspiration.

Agroup of Year 13 students is given the opportunity to participate in a comprehensive mentoring programme with key business representatives. Students engage in a variety of individual and group activities which support the development of skills and qualities for the workplace. They also visit their mentors at work, gaining a unique and invaluable insight into their work environment and key responsibilities. Highlights have been a summer internship with Citibank and this year a virtual week with PwC.

COLLEGE HIGHLIGHTS

Over the past year there were many things of merit, here are just some of our headlines:

- 100% of our Year 12 students achieved 5+ A*-C grades at GCSE level (or equivalent)
- 90% of our Year 14 students achieved 3+ A*-E grades at A Level (or equivalent)

FACILITIES

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Abbey Community College students and staff work together in a modern building which has been well maintained and regularly updated in recent years.

Access to a 3G pitch nearby supports the delivery of the Physical Education and sports programme.

Whilst these things are all very important we believe that a successful school is about much more than buildings and equipment. It is about people; students and staff who treat each other with respect, support and encourage each other to be the best they can be at all times.





SUPPORTING LEARNING

Our child centred approach ensures that all students have the opportunity to be both challenged and supported to achieve their full potential during their seven years at Abbey Community College.

Should the need arise, students can have access to our Specialist Provision for Learning, Autism or Nurture classes. This is through the allocation of a Statement of Special Educational Needs by the Education Authority. A team of highly skilled and experienced staff put a range of support strategies in place to ensure that each individual is given every opportunity to progress and learn.

ATTENDANCE & PUNCTUALITY

All students are expected to come to school on time each day and strive to have full attendance. This ensures that valuable learning opportunities are not missed and each individual can make maximum progress.

Attendance and punctuality are monitored closely by parents/quardians through the use of the SIMs Parent App that provides live attendance data. Weekly notifications are also sent out on the App summarising attendance.

A designated phone line is available daily to report attendance and punctuality issues to a member of the office staff. The whole school level of attendance for 2020/21 was 89%.

HOME LEARNING

We believe that homework is a valuable means of supporting and enhancing learning beyond the confines of the school day. This enables students to develop good study habits, independence and take responsibility for their own learning.

The Student Planner helps students develop the organisational skills to plan their work and meet deadlines. Teaching staff use the SIMS Parent App to record homework tasks, this enables parents to see what has to be done and monitor its completion.

All staff have developed best practice in working online allowing students access to learning and resources at home. Google Classroom is the online platform used by all subject areas where students can submit work remotely and receive feedback.



CELEBRATING SUCCESS

Through our assemblies and rewards system we take every opportunity to acknowledge academic achievement and highlight the many successes of our students in sport and other extra-curricular activities. Our Annual Prize Giving is a significant event which enables families and members of the community to celebrate with us.

ASSEMBLIES

Our school community comes together regularly in:

- Year Assemblies
- Junior, Senior and Upper School Assemblies
- Whole School Assemblies

These events give us the opportunity to develop our school ethos, celebrate success and pray together.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

All students in Years 8-12 study Religious Education as part of their core curriculum and have the opportunity to achieve a formal qualification at GCSE level.

Parents who wish to withdraw their child from Religious Education or assemblies should consult the Principal to make alternative arrangements.

STUDENT TRANSPORT

An extensive transport network serves Abbey Community College on Bridge Road. A designated school bus service is provided for students to travel to and from school. HEALTH & WELLBEING

To promote health and wellbeing, students are encouraged to make healthy decisions in all aspects of their lives both in and outside school. Our catering facilities provide students and staff with a range of healthy hot and cold food and drink choices during the school day. The consumption of fizzy and high energy drinks during the school day is not permitted.

The Learning for Life and Work and Class Tutor programmes aim to holistically develop the skills which will enable every student to make appropriate, healthy lifelong decisions and become responsible contributors to our evolving society. Drugs Education and RSE policies ensure that all students have the knowledge and skills to enable them to make safe and healthy lifestyle choices both during their time at school and into the future. Effective partnerships with a variety of professional agencies and services support all aspects of student health and wellbeing.

Our School Nurse project, in partnership with the NHSCT, supports the health and wellbeing of everyone in our school community. A variety of groups and activities promote positive health messages and experiences. We also have a team of qualified First Aiders on-site each day. To assist our pastoral team, we have appointed a School Social Worker who supports our student's health and wellbeing, implementing preventative work around the themes of attendance, safeguarding, behaviour support and linking in with external agencies.



PARENTAL PARTNERSHIPS

The role of Parents/Guardians in supporting our students towards success cannot be underestimated. Our partnership is key to ensuring that each individual student achieves their full potential. We ask for your support in the following ways:

- Encourage your child to attend regularly and on time
- Ensure that your child wears their uniform and takes pride in their appearance
- Attend meetings and Parent Evenings to discuss your child's progress
- Contact us if there are issues or concerns that may affect your child
- Support the completion of homework and sign the Student Planner each week

College staff are welcoming and approachable. Through our 'Open Door' policy you can make contact with us by telephone or in person should the need arise. We maintain strong communication links with our families through the use of the SIMS Parent App, our website, Facebook and Twitter.

The Friends of Abbey group was established to bring together parents, friends and staff to raise funds for the College and to be an important consultation group.

TRIPS & VISITS

A variety of trips and visits are organised by staff throughout the year to support key aspects of learning and create opportunities for students to have new experiences and enhance their personal development. Recent school trips include the ski trip to Austria, football trip to Liverpool and the Health & Social Care visit to Prague.

INTERNATIONAL DIMENSION

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Over the past five years a particularly exciting development is the unique opportunity for Post 16 students at Abbey Community College to apply for a summer placement working as a Camp Counsellor at an activity camp in the USA. This gives our young people a fantastic experience of a lifetime, to live abroad, meet new friends and develop their leadership, communication and organisational skills.

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STUDENT DESTINATIONS

To date, a significant number of our young people have secured places on a range of undergraduate courses such as Art, Biomedical Engineering, Biomedical Science, Business Management, Communication and Counselling, Computer Science, Criminology with Forensic Science, Digital Media, Education, Early Childhood Studies, Hospitality Management and Tourism, Nursing, Physical Education, Sport and Teaching. They have progressed to study at various Higher Education institutions such as Queen's University, Ulster University, University of Brighton, University of Cumbria, Liverpool John Moore's, Stranmillis University College, Belfast Metropolitan College and Northern Regional College.

Others progressed to a variety of Further Education courses at Belfast Metropolitan College, Northern Regional College, secured an apprenticeship, took up training opportunities or made the transition directly into employment in their chosen field.

As 'a school at the heart of the community with the community at the heart of the school' Abbey Community College works in partnership with parents, local education providers, business and community based groups to build opportunities for community education, sports participation and family support.

ADMISSION INTO YEAR 8

Respective functions of the Board of Governors and Principal in relation to Admissions to Abbey Community College

The Admissions Criteria for Abbey Community College have been agreed by the Board of Governors. The application of the criteria has been delegated to the Admissions Sub Committee which includes the Principal. When considering students for admission, the Board of Governors will only take into account information which is detailed on or uploaded with the online application form.

CRITERIA FOR ADMISSION OF STUDENTS

- 1. Applicants resident in Northern Ireland, at the time of their proposed admission, will be selected for admission before any applicant not so resident may be selected.
- 2. Applicants who, at the date of their application, have a child of the family' currently enrolled at the school
- 3. Applicants who, at the date of their application, are the eldest child of the family^{**} eligible to apply to a non-selective, mainstream, post-primary school.
- 4. Applicants who, at the time of their application, have a parent employed within the school.
- 5. Applicants who live closest to Abbey Community College as decided by digital measurement of a straight line from the front door of their home to the front door of the school using the map on www.spatialni.gov.uk and an Ordnance Survey Spreadsheet to calculate distance in metres. All addresses must be verified by proof of address e.g. Utility Bill.
- 6. In the event of oversubscription students will be admitted by a criterion that prioritises applicants where the letters of their surname (as entered on a Birth Certificate) places them on a rank established by the random selection of letters in the order set out below:

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In the event of surnames beginning with the same initial letter, the subsequent letters of the surname will be used in alphabetical order. In the event of two identical surnames, the alphabetical order of the initials of the forenames will be used.

DUTY TO VERIFY

Applicants should note that it is their responsibility to ensure that they provide documents to verify information pertinent to the school's admission criteria when submitting their Transfer Application online. It must be written on headed notepaper and signed by one of the following who is not a member of the applicant's family:

The provision of false or incorrect information or the failure to provide verifying documents by the required deadline may result in the withdrawal of a place.

ADMISSIONS TO YEAR 8 AFTER 1 SEPTEMBER 2022

Parents wishing to have their child considered for admission after 1 September 2022 should write to the Principal clearly stating this. In the event of a vacancy the above criteria will be applied to these applications.

APPLICATIONS FOR ADMISSION OTHER THAN YEAR 8

When applications are received for year groups 9-14, the enrolment numbers in each year group will be considered alongside student numbers in practical groups. If these numbers are at maximum levels, a waiting list will be compiled.

Each application will be considered by the Admissions Committee of the Board of Governors

In the event that there are more applicants than places available, the following criteria will be considered in this order:

- member of the clergy or equivalent primary school principal


- 1. Applicants who, at the date of their application, have a child of the family^{*} currently enrolled at the school
- 2. Applicants who live closest to Abbey Community College as decided by digital measurement of a straight line from the front door of their home to the front door of the school using the map on www. spatialni.gov.uk and an Ordnance Survey Spreadsheet to calculate distance in metres. All addresses must be verified by proof of address e.g. Utility Bill.
- 3. In the event of oversubscription students will be admitted by a criterion that prioritises applicants where the letters of their surname (as entered on a Birth Certificate) places them on a rank established by the random selection of letters in the order set out below:

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If there are no places available, Parents / Guardians will be asked in writing if they wish their child's name to be added to the waiting list. The list will expire at the end of the academic year on 31 August 2023.

GUIDANCE NOTES

Child of the family – brother, sister, step-brother, step-sister, adopted/fostered child or child living permanently in the same household. ** Eldest Eligible Child – child is the oldest child in the family eligible to transfer to post primary school e.g. an only child, the oldest child applying for a mainstream post-primary place, the child is more than 7 years younger than their next sibling, the family has moved into the area and this is the first child eligible to apply to the school.



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
